### **Museum News**

The museum council will be hosting a grand opening of the *Box of Rocks* on November 1<sup>st</sup> from 1 to 5 PM. The collection of over 200 artifacts was donated to the museum by Mr. Herbert Ridgeway Collins of Caroline County. A slide presentation titled *A Box of Rocks* shows the research methods that were used to help identify prehistoric tools, including projectile points, axes, wedges, and pounding tools as well as shards of vessels and ceremonial tools.

Mr. Collins will be at the museum for the afternoon to meet and greet guests. He has authored numerous books and has spent a lifetime immersed in American history. He is a Smithsonian Curator Emeritus and was an



executive director of the American History Museum. Many of the items in the collection that he has donated to the museum have come from a lifetime of walking the newly tilled fields on his farm in Caroline County.

Ruth served as a trustee of the Historic St. John's Church Restoration Association and on the King William County Architectural Review Board.
