

King William County Record Book 1 Available

The King William County Historical Society's Transcription Committee is pleased to announce for purchase The King William County Record Book 1 (1702-1707). This is a key-word searchable, digital-only Adobe PDF which includes the full transcription of each page conveniently displayed opposite the high-resolution, full-color digital image of the surviving document.

Not only will you be able to easily search for people, place names, dates, and other important information across 400+ pages in mere seconds, but you'll also have helpful annotations about many of the deeds, a detailed explanation of historic terminology, and a summary of the transcription project's history. Each copy costs \$50 with the proceeds supporting the King William County Museum.

The document is available on a thumb drive and is copyrighted, password protected and print restricted. This work



builds on the prior success of the King William County Deed Book Imaging Project, which can still be acquired for anyone interested. That thumb drive provides copies of all 9000 pages of deeds across 19 surviving deed books up until 1888, along with a copy of the previously published index (it does not include any transcriptions and is not keyword searchable). Record Book 1 is the first of the 19 record books our historical society intends to transcribe and we anticipate Record Book 2 being ready for purchase later this summer.

MT. ZOAR: A HOMESITE AND STATE FOREST

King William County is home to two of Virginia's only 25 State Forest's: Sandy Point and Zoar State Forest. Together, they cover 2,341 acres of land. Zoar, although much smaller than Sandy Point, is incredibly rich in history. Originally owned by Colonel William Aylett, the property was acquired by Robert Pollard in 1782. Pollard founded his family's home atop a hill which sat high above the then-bustling port town of Aylett. At the time, Aylett was the farthest inland port other than Dunkirk just upriver. The town was so prosperous that it supported a race track, which in turn purportedly supported gambling, prostitution and other such illegal activities.

As the local legend goes, Robert Pollard found the lower-lying town to be filled with vice and sinful people. He therefore likened Aylett to the biblical cities of Sodom and Gomorrah, which were destroyed by God for their corruption and debauchery. Robert Pollard named his home site Mt. Zoar after the city overlooking Sodom and Gomorrah, which was spared by God.

For centuries afterward, the Pollards continued living on this same parcel of land. Unfortunately, the first two homes burned along with much of the original furniture. The house that stands today was ordered from Sears and Roebuck and was shipped up the Mattaponi via steamboat and was assembled in 1901 on site. It is one of the few examples of Queen Anne architecture in this part of the State. The farm house is complete with several outbuildings as well as a family cemetery which is surrounded by a handsome brick wall.

The Pollard family continued to occupy the house until the 1960's. In 1987, Robert H. Stoddard donated his family's ancestral lands to the Commonwealth of Virginia as a State Forest. Stoddard donated two parcels, both along river road, covering 378 acres of land. As agreed upon, the Forestry department has maintained the land in roughly the same field to forest ratio as it had been when it was donated in 1987. Today there is canoe access as well as 1.5 miles of hiking trails which meander through the forest and along the scenic Mattaponi River. The farm house functions as an office and is open to the public during normal business hours.


